Total Fentanyl Related Deaths in 2017 was 53 2020 it was 86; combined with Other Drugs in 2017 was 37 and in 2020 it was 71, Fentanyl-Only Deaths in 2017 was 16 and in 2020 it was 15.

What is the difference?

Detox Treatments Centers:

In some cases, when someone goes through a detox they experience forms of withdrawal that can be life threatening. A program that gives support to guide patients through withdrawal and the symptoms that come with it. This also includes providing medicine to help ease the symptoms as well as care for medical and mental health conditions.

Inpatient Rehabilitation Centers:

An inpatient Rehabilitation Center is where the patient lives at the hospital, detox clinic, or rehab center during the process of overcoming addiction. Care is around the clock to help the patient

Residential rehab: the patient lives at the center. Programs usually run for 1-3 months, these are good if the patient has a more serious problem and struggle to stay sober.

Halfway Houses:

Halfway houses are transitional living spaces for those in recovery from drugs or alcohol. Sometimes they can be referred as “sober living houses”. Some people go to halfway houses from a treatment center, prison, or a homeless situation, while other will go to be in a sober and clean environment to begin the recovery process.

Most halfway houses require the residents to pass a breathalyzer and drug screening tests as they aren't equipped to deal with withdrawal symptoms from drugs. Many halfway houses are run by people who themselves were at

one time a halfway house resident. Halfway houses give the patients more freedom than the other forms of treatment, most can come and go as they please as long as they follow certain rules the house has set up for them to follow. Patients are expected to be responsible for themselves.

Types of Halfway Houses:

Level 1: Peer run recovery residence—offer supportive housing in a community based peer environment. Residents are self-monitoring and accountable for each other. While there is no paid staff, there is an overseeing operator who facilitates admissions and discharges to the home. There are no in-house services at this level. This level is for those who has physically and psychologically stabilized for a period of time from substance abuse and would benefit from a sober environment that enables them to implement personal recovery in a safe community. Appropriate for a more mature individual who has established adult living skills, is able to self-regulate, and is committed to recovery.

Level 2: Monitored Recovery Residence—community based environment supervised by a senior resident, house manager, or staff member. This member monitors operations and residents, and enforces the structure that is implemented in the form of house rules or standards. This level is appropriate for the individual with some intrinsic motivation who would benefit from structure and support. This level allows for an increased ability to access services over a longer period of time due to the affordability.

Level 3: Supervised recovery residence—these provide an increased level of structure and oversight, and often utilize a clinical component of some kind (outpatient or aftercare services). This level offers life skill oriented programming in house or in cooperation with other service providers. This is for those who just got out of a stabilizing residential treatment center.

Level 4: Service provider recovery residence—this type of recovery service provides peer-based services plus life skills and clinical programming. It is most often aligned with a licensed treatment provider. Licensed and credentialed staff members provide in house program services. Stays can vary from several weeks to several months, this level is the level before residential living or independent living. This is for the individual that needs a high degree of structure and support, someone new to the recovery process and in need of life skill development.

Outpatient Treatment Centers:

In this type of treatment center the patient will get some treatment during the day and then be sent home. This works best if the patient's health is good and home is stable.

Partial hospitalization or day treatment: where you live at home but spend 4-8 hours a day in a hospital or clinic. These usually last around 3 months. This is more helpful if they need medical care and have a stable home life.

Intensive outpatient: where the patient spends 9-20 hours a week in treatment. Can last between 2 months and a year. This is good if they have a solid home life and a lower chance of relapse.
